LESSONS

ASPIRE ACADEMY


Our Aspire Academy will nurture your talents and develop your abilities, giving you the best chance of fulfilling your potential. You will also benefit from university outreach initiatives, field trips, specialist Brock-Extra opportunities, summer school options and intercollege competitions.

As an Aspire student, you will work with your Aspire Tutor to develop a bespoke Study Programme that will enable you to grow into the learner and ultimately the professional you want to become. Importantly, you will have opportunities to participate in supra-curricular activities designed to enhance your abilities and support you in your guest for success.

Naturally, it helps if you know what you are aiming to achieve. However, many learners prefer to keep their options open at Further Education level. Therefore, do not worry if you are still undecided. We will help you develop that all-important sense of vision for your future.

"I applied for Cambridge's **Higher Aspirations** programme because I've wanted to go to study at an Oxbridge university from a young age. When I saw the opportunity, I thought it was a great way to deepen my knowledge, particularly in historical areas. I'm focusing on the Anglo-Saxon, Norse, and Celtic course at Cambridge, which is similar to Classical Civilisation but explores a different era and location with a blend of **English Literature elements."**

Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)

The EPQ gives you the opportunity to research an area of your choice beyond your A Level courses. It is equivalent to one AS Level (UCAS points) and can be studied in your second year.

You will develop your academic skills through the process of planning and refining your research to make a final presentation. Your project can be either a research project or an artefact such as a piece of music or a film script.

You will be taught and mentored in small groups. Every year students complete scientific and social science-based projects. Past projects have included: The impact of pesticides on bee populations; Is the NHS being privatised by stealth?: Existentialism in the work of Dostoevsky; Women in Victorian society.

University of Cambridge Initiative

Our University of Cambridge Initiative is aimed at highachieving first year A Level students and features outreach opportunities led by the University of Cambridge.

It includes:

- Workshops led by academics and students from the University of Cambridge.
- Seminars delivered by academics from the University of Cambridge.
- Extension classes in a range of core subjects.

Reading Scholars

Reading Scholars is a programme offered by the University of Reading covering core and artsrelated subjects. You may apply for Reading Scholars in your first term at Brock.

The scheme gives you a tangible taste of life as a university undergraduate and provides practical support for the Higher Education application process. It also features input from leading academics, current undergraduate e-mentors and Reading alumni.



At Brockenhurst College we have a history of strong results across the STEM subjects. So, if you want to gain added support for your STEM learning, then come and join our STEM Academy.

What are the advantages?

Our STEM Academy is designed to support students studying Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM), and promote high achievement.

If you are considering a career in science, engineering, medicine, veterinary science, or any other STEM-related area, then this extra learning opportunity is definitely one for you.

Special activities

Being part of our STEM Academy means you will have the chance to participate in extra activities including competitions, trips and talks by visiting speakers.

Here are some examples of recent opportunities:

- British Science Week, featuring a range of visiting speakers.
- Community volunteer programme for medics and vets.
- Educational trips to Iceland, Switzerland (CERN) and elsewhere.
- Physics and Biology Challenges and Olympiads.
- Subject conferences and masterclasses.
- Support with special papers like BMAT, MAT and STEP.

- UK Senior Maths Challenge (individual and team) and Olympiad.
- University of Southampton Ambassadors programme.

The Greenwood Bursary

The Greenwood Bursary funds university tuition fees for a Brock student who has excelled in STEM subjects and faces financial hardship. This bursary funds three years of a full degree course for a student who has selected a degree programme in a STEM subject.

The Greenwood Bursary may only be awarded to one student a year. It was established in 2018 by retired Lyndhurst couple, John and Marion Greenwood, who together have backgrounds in both engineering and education.


Becoming part of the academy means...

Arrival

"I take the bus to college and the stop is just a short walk from my house – it's always reliable and convenient. On the bus I speak to my friends and listen to music."

"In my first lesson of the day I take photos for my projects using different angles and camera settings."

"Lesson four is mostly about collaboration. I join with likeminded students to discuss project ideas and share practical tips for improving our work."

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

You can be certain of getting all the financial support you are entitled to receive, thanks to our Student Finance team. Finance matters can be tricky, but they have all the knowledge and experience you need.

WELLBEING SUPPORT

You can count on our specialist welfare professionals if you ever feel you need personalised assistance to support your wellbeing. This group includes nurses and counsellors, plus a dedicated Student Liaison and Security Officer.

TRANSITION SUPPORT

You can make the best possible transition to college by drawing on our multi-layered transition support. Importantly, staff will enable you to become an able, curious, independent learner, who can access everything needed for success.

STUDENT SERVICES

You can resolve any practical challenges you might encounter by visiting Student Services. Staff are on-hand to address problems like travel disruption, a lost travel pass, and funding issues, among others.

CAREERS SUPPORT

You can thoroughly investigate all the career options that might be right for you, thanks to our careers professionals. Together they hold the Quality in Careers Standard for their exemplary careers education, information, advice and guidance.

BROCK HUB

You can get help and support for your learning by dropping in to Brock Hub. This independent and group study zone is full of reading and tech resources, with helpful staff always available to assist.

PROGRESSION SUPPORT

You can count on our progression support to help you make well-informed decisions about your Sixth Form journey, as well as your post-18 route to success. Initiatives include help and support for your apprenticeship or UCAS applications.

We realise that sometimes you might need some extra support in order to do your best. That is why we have teams of specialist staff on-hand to help you with your learning. This assistance can take a variety of forms, and it will only be applied following detailed consultations with you about what you feel is necessary.

LEARNING DIFFICULTIES AND DISABILITIES (LDD)

Our LDD professionals support the consultation, implementation and annual review of EHCPs. If you have a history of benefitting from extra assistance, your needs will be assessed before you enrol, and any necessary arrangements will be made. If you do not have a history of benefitting from extra assistance, you may still be eligible for added support, based on need.

LEARNING SUPPORT ASSISTANTS (LSAs)

Our LSAs are trained professionals who are available to help you get the most out of your studies by doing your very best. Each one has a wealth of experience in helping young people overcome barriers to learning. Students who benefit have reported that LSA involvement makes a critical difference to their learning.

THE LODGE

The Lodge is an allocated space for students with EHCPs. It is staffed by Learning Support Assistants and has proven very popular. The Lodge is a typical dwelling house, which stands at the entrance to our main campus.

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT



TRANSITION SUPPORT





- Beauty Level 3 Diploma



TRAVEL

At Brock we offer a range of subsidised travel options, and our discounted college bus passes are available on an annual, termly or monthly basis.

Depending on your circumstances, you could also benefit from bursary support towards rail travel costs and further bus discounts. For more details and to access our bursary application form, please visit www.brock.ac.uk/bursaries

Bus network

Our network of 10 dedicated bus services covers areas not serviced by trains. For greater flexibility, college bus passes are also valid on some BlueStar and MoreBus services, with evening and weekend use included free of charge.

Train travel

Train passes provide flexible travel entitlement to suit any timetable. For 50% off daily and season rail tickets, make sure to check out the 16-17 Saver Railcard at 16-17saver.co.uk

Travel to and from the Isle of Wight

Student-rate ferry passes are available through the Wightlink and Red Funnel websites. Importantly, connecting buses and trains run from both terminals.

Creating a Study Programme that fits your preferred study style, subject strengths and career aspirations is a pivotal opportunity to lay the groundwork for success.

Here is a breakdown of each element to consider:



What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a job. It's a paid opportunity that combines learning with training to give you a leg-up into the career you want.

How do I apply?

First you need to find an employer with an apprenticeship vacancy, which is a bit like job-hunting. At Brock we normally have around 20 vacancies at any one time that represent a range of industries and service sectors. Email apprenticeships@brock.ac.uk to find out more.

How do apprenticeships work?

As an apprentice you must attain knowledge and skills to an approved (often accredited) national standard. This helps ensure you can pave the way to a successful future while adding value to your employer's business.

How much does it cost?

An apprenticeship will cost you nothing. That's because it's paid for by the government and your employer. However, you must provide the time and effort needed to make a success of the opportunity.

How are you assessed?

All apprenticeships now have an independent End Point Assessment (EPA). Each assessment corresponds to the apprenticeship standard. Our training specialists can help explain what this means for you. EPAs won't happen until you and your employer decide you're ready, and 'distinction' grades are available for apprentices who excel.

What is the commitment?

You'll commit to participating in all necessary training over one to four years, depending on your chosen job role. You'll also commit to forging a solid relationship with your employer and college Assessor, and complete all necessary college work. Importantly, you'll spend 20% of your time in 'off-the-job' training, which will be paid and may include time spent learning at college.

How am I supported?

You'll receive regular visits from your college Assessor, during which you can talk about your progress and discuss any problems. You'll also have access to our facilities and student support services, which means extra help with important things like CV-writing and answering interview questions.



APPRENTICE Q&A

"Hi, I'm Ben Rush. I'm currently a Sous Chef at Balmer Lawn Hotel & Spa in Brockenhurst. I completed my Professional Cookery Level 3 apprenticeship at Brockenhurst College."

Why did you choose an apprenticeship at Brock?

"I had worked with a private training provider for my Level 2 course and was not impressed. I wanted a much more professional and thorough approach to my apprenticeship, and the reputation of Brockenhurst College helped me make my decision."

How were you supported by your employer?

"My employer was fully supportive and always gave me the time and the space to work with my Assessor, as well as paying for all the ingredients for me to complete my assessments and the practice sessions."

What were you doing before you started your apprenticeship?

"I was working in a restaurant where it was 'full-on', but there was no real time for learning or progression. Doing my apprenticeship has allowed me to do both."

How did Brock help you?

"The staff at Brock listened to me and supported me at all times. My supervisors were flexible with regard to when their visits took place, and they were able to spend longer with me when I required more attention. They were also available outside of our appointment times to talk through areas I was not sure about."

How did your apprenticeship fit with your longterm career goals?

"My apprenticeship helped me to gain promotion at work and developed my confidence and interpersonal skills. It also enabled me to progress to more senior positions that would not have otherwise been available to me. When I qualified I was promoted to Sous Chef by my employer."

EMPLOYER Q&A

"Hi, I'm Zoe Ormerod. I'm the Senior Human Resources Advisor at the New Forest District Council."

How are you involved with apprenticeships?

"We've been employing apprentices for many years, and since 2010 this has really taken a leap forward. The rest of the Human Resources team and I are involved in trying to find suitable opportunities for apprentices across our workforce. These opportunities vary from time to time, but generally we aim to match skills that our managers need with an existing apprenticeship scheme."

What sort of training and support do you provide?

"As well as allowing for 20% off-the-job training as part of the apprenticeship framework, we provide the bulk of additional knowledge and skills training. This includes the apprenticeship standard itself, as well as personal development and any other training that might be relevant."

How do apprenticeships benefit your organisation?

"Apprenticeships benefit our teams and the council as a whole by bringing fresh approaches and perspectives that are unique to young people. We get the additional pair of hands, and they get to train for a responsible and rewarding job role while also earning money. It's a win-win situation."

How many apprentices do you take on?

"The number of apprentices varies from year to year. It really depends on what the organisation needs at the time. We aim to employ apprentices right across all the services provided by the council, and we tend to have between 10 and 15 apprentices at any one time."

What happens when an apprenticeship ends?

"If we have appropriate job vacancies for an individual reaching the end of their apprenticeship, then we strongly encourage them to apply for that role. From Brockenhurst College we recruited a young woman called Ellie as a customer services apprentice, and she is now a permanent member of staff, working as a Customer Services Supervisor and mentoring new apprentices. So, as you can tell, it's a very positive cycle that we are keen to continue. We also have a Level 3 accountancy apprentice, who will be continuing with us to achieve a Level 4 apprenticeship qualification. Quite often we have grounds maintenance apprentices who go on to secure permanent roles with us as well."
